How do you teach with TEACCH? Physical structure. Look at the environment you are using, is it right for learning? You need to remove as many distractions as possible. Put toys ... Physical prompting. Visual structure. Scheduling / sequencing. Teach the method structure.

### TEACCH - Special Education and Activities for Kids with ...

TEACCH is centered on five basic principles. First, physical structure refers to individual's immediate surroundings. Daily activities, such as playing and eating, work best when they are clearly defined by physical boundaries. Second, having a consistent schedule is possible through various mediums, such as drawings and photographs.
