Court personnel refer to the statewide roster to locate and schedule court interpreters for court hearings. Court interpreters are hired at the county-level directly by the Minnesota district courts. The roster is also available to public agencies, attorneys, and others requiring interpretation services as they search for qualified interpreters ...

Additionally, interpreting services can be provided for LEP and deaf individuals outside the courtroom for activities or services that are operated or managed by the Court.
